COURSE DESCRIPTION

The university catalogue states: SPMT 440 "is an interdisciplinary examination of sport as a global phenomenon. Historical, cultural, economic, and governance perspectives are considered." We will do this and more.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 1. Explain the origins of modern sports on a worldwide scale
- 2. Explain the role sports has played in international politics
- 3. Explain the significance of popular international sporting institutions
- 4. Explain the significance of global sports heroes
- 5. Explain the globalization of sport
- 6. Explain the ways in which international sport is managed and marketed
- 7. Explain the cultural impact sport has played in both first-world and developing nations
- 8. Research and write an original paper on a topic relating to sports in a modern, global setting

COURSE OVERVIEW

SPMT 440 examines the global sporting experience from the nineteenth century to the present. Specific topics will include the formation of modern sports on a global scale, sports and colonialism, the origins and evolution of such worldwide sporting institutions as the Olympic Games and the World Cup, the political usage of sports, the cultural significance of global sports heroes, globalization and sports, the marketing of international sports, and sports and the developing world. A variety of methods will be used during class time, including lecture, discussion, student presentations, as well as watching video and listening to music. Attendance is mandatory. Make-up exams require a doctor's note or some other form of sufficient documentation.

There will be two exams—one midterm and one final. In addition, you are expected to write a research paper (20-25 pages, double spaced). The topic is your choice, but you must write a brief prospectus (no more than two pages) that discusses the subject and the sources you plan to use. At the end of the semester, you will present your paper

to the class. The brief presentation should last no longer than fifteen minutes. Lastly, participation in class and two outside assignments will comprise the final ten percent of your grade. I expect you to come to class having not only done the reading but also having thought about it.
