PREREQUISITES

COURSE DESCRIPTION: Teaches the fundamentals of officiating soccer including a thorough discussion of each of the rules as well as instruction of crew mechanics. Provides opportunity of becoming a certified US Soccer official.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

This class provides an immediate vehicle for the students to apply the skills learned in a competitive athletic environment. Those choosing to become certified officials and meeting the requirements will be eligible to officiate soccer in the United States (50 states). All students will learn the rules of soccer and be able to:

- Discuss the complex role of the official in competitive soccer
- Employ correct USSF & FIFA rules in practice and game situations
- Practice the skills needed to be a successful official in game situations
- Identify correct rules and mechanics on tests and/or quizzes
- Demonstrate the correct mechanics and signals in game situations.

INSTRUCTOR EXPECTATIONS

- 1. All assigned reading and on-line teaching for each class is expected to be done prior to coming to class.
- 2. All written assignments must be typed in APA format (computer word processing is recommended).
- 3. Regular attendance and participation is expected. If you miss a class, it is your responsibility to obtain class materials from sources other than the instructor. Attendance will be monitored and attendance is defined as arriving on time for class and remaining in class.
- 4. You will be expected to check emails regularly from the instructor.

CLASS ATTENDANCE

It enhances your academic success to be in class; therefore, you should attend ALL scheduled class meetings. Students are expected to attend the class periods of the courses for which they register and attend those classes **on time**. In-class participation is important not only to the individual student, but to the class as a whole. Because class participation is a factor in grading, instructors may use absence, tardiness, or early departure as de facto evidence of nonparticipation. Texting in class is **NOT** acceptable behavior; neither is falling asleep. It is assumed that laptops are being used to take notes or to follow Blackboard power points; other use is a distraction to your classmates and the instructor.

PARTICIPATION

Respect the free exchange of thought in an academic environment and the participants therein. For example: a) do not have any sound emitting devices turned on; b) wait until the teacher/guest speaker has finished prior to gathering your belongings; and c) do not smoke, chew tobacco, eat, sleep, disrupt others by inappropriate talking,

or disrespect the class schedule by being tardy. You are encouraged to a) feel free to openly and respectfully contribute your thoughts; b) listen actively to the comments of others; c) be punctual; d) ask any and all appropriate questions that you have; and e) maintain civility in your interpersonal communications. Class discussions will be conducted in a civil, informed fashion wherein disruptive students will be asked to leave the class. Your contributions are not only welcomed, they are essential.

ALTERNATIVE WORK

There is NO make-up work. There will be on-line instruction and testing for US Soccer certification. Only those excused absences supported by documentation will be addressed at the instructor's discretion on an individual basis (e.g. a physician's note for an illness). Alternative work due to intercollegiate athletic competitions or other legitimate university activity must be arranged **PRIOR** to due date. A grade of '0' will be assigned to all missed work unless otherwise determined by the instructor. You are strongly encouraged to hand assignments in on time.

GRADING There will be NO extra credit.

The instructor is solely responsible for assigning grades. As such, the instructor reserves the right to assess student performance in each of the categories identified in the EVALUATION section of this syllabus. Student non-compliance with stated academic, honor, attendance, or participation expectations will result in a '0' for the associated evaluation.

NATURE OF COURSE DELIVERY

Face to face lecture, on-line instruction and tests, on-field interactive module.

REQUIRED READINGS

Students will read the IAB Laws of the game and watch the appropriate US Soccer and FIFA videos as outlined by the instructor. The student will be responsible for downloading the Laws of the Game from the IAB website (provided by the instructor). Non-required, suggested supplemental materials will be recommended in class.

CERTIFICATION

Successful completion of the US Soccer material and test will certify the student after payment of \$50 for certification and a badge. Benefits of certification will be covered in class.

EVALUATION

This course will be graded on a percentage system, with a total of 100% possible:

US Soccer test Grade 8 - A combination of short answer, multiple choice, and true/false questions; will cover laws 1-17 and other in-class discussions.
