University Catalog Course Description

In-depth examination of the tourist experience at popular sacred sites and at attractions that offer socially unapproved or harmful personal touristic experiences. Management issues at touristic sacred sites and dark tourism enterprises will be identified and compared.

Course Overview

This is an upper-level course identifies the nature of sacred sites and related tourist experiences (pilgrimage, gawking, conversion, enterprise). The juxtaposition of profane exposition and sacred involvement will be examined from participant and site management perspectives. Students will survey a range of practices for managing the sacred site tourism experience. The course also identifies the nature and extent of tourism that is based on socially unacceptable and possibly illegal leisure activities. Inversion theory will be applied to tourist behavior and the practical aspects of managing dark tourism will be examined. Students will compare the personal experiences and management challenges of sacred site tourism and dark tourism.

Course Delivery Method

This course will be delivered online (76% or more) using an asynchronous format via Blackboard Learning Management system (LMS) housed in the MyMason portal. You will log in to the Blackboard (Bb) course site using your Mason email name (everything before @masonlive.gmu.edu) and email password. The course site will be available every day beginning August 20th, 2021. All course work and assignments must be completed within a strict timeline (See PROPOSED CLASS SCHEDULE below). **No late work is accepted.**

Under no circumstances, may candidates/students participate in online class sessions (either by phone or Internet) while operating motor vehicles. Further, as expected in a face-to-face class meeting, such online participation requires undivided attention to course content and communication.

Technical Requirements

In order to participate in this course, students will need to satisfy the following technical requirements:

- High-speed Internet access with a standard up-to-date browser, either Internet Explorer or Mozilla Firefox is required (note: Opera and Safari are not compatible with Blackboard).

Expectations

- Course Week: Because asynchronous courses do not have a "fixed" meeting day, our week will start on Monday, and finish on Sunday.

Students are responsible for any and all information relayed on the website, including any announcements.

Students must always re-read their responses carefully before posting them, so others do not consider them personally offenses. Be positive in your approach with others and diplomatic in selecting your words. Remember that you are not competing with classmates, but sharing information and learning from others. All faculty are expected to be respectful in all communications as well.

Course Objectives

This course is designed to enable students to do the following:

1. Differentiate between sacred and profane tourism sites and experiences.
2. Classify tourist sites or events according to their sacredness to different population segments.
3. Identify and describe management practices that protect or enhance the sacred experience.

4. Identify and develop management practices that appropriately interpret sacred sites or events to profane audiences.
5. Demonstrate appropriately respectful behavior at a variety of sacred sites.
6. Define and provide examples of dark tourism.
7. Describe the motivations and desired benefits of tourists traveling for 'dark' experiences.
8. Apply inversion theory to understanding the appeal of dark tourism.
9. Describe significant management challenges and opportunities in the field of dark tourism.
10. Compare and contrast the personal experiences and management challenges of sacred site tourism and dark tourism.

Course Performance Evaluation

Students are expected to submit all assignments on time through Blackboard. If there are issues with Blackboard, you may also email these assignments to the instructor. **No late work will be accepted.**

- **Assignments**

This course will be graded on a point (and NOT on a percentage) system, with a total of 200 possible points. There are 5 grading requirements: (1) quizzes; (2) discussion posts; (3) group project; and (4) final paper. **Late work is not accepted.** Each requirement is briefly introduced below:

1. Quizzes (20 points): There are two quizzes, one in Module 2 and one in Module 8. Each quiz is multiple choice and worth 10 points each.

2. Discussion Board Posts (35 points): There are 7 discussion board posts. All initial posts are due by Friday at 11:59pm. You are also required to respond to two other posts, due Sunday nights by 11:59 pm. **You are required to put thoughtful reflections into your post, and will be graded accordingly.**

3. Assignments (20 points): There are 2 assignments due, each is worth 10 points. See blackboard for instructions.

4. Midterm (30 points): The Midterm is on Blackboard. It consists of 30 multiple choice questions from the assigned readings in Modules 1 through 7. You have 60 minutes to complete the test.

5. Final Exam (30 points): The Final is on Blackboard. It consists of 30 multiple choice questions from the assigned readings in Modules 8 through 13. You have 60 minutes to complete the test.

6. Site Visit (30 points): You must visit a local tourist site related to sacred sites or dark tourism. The approved list of sites can be found on blackboard. You must write a report and include pictures as evidence of your visit. See blackboard for more details.

Note: SafeAssign will also help you to identify how to properly attribute sources rather than paraphrase, as well as to make sure that you are compliant with GMU's Honor Code.

Other Requirements

Students are expected to respond to all emails from the instructor in a timely manner. Failure to do so will result in a loss of points coordinating to the assignment that necessitated the email.
